We'll be asking the children for their thoughts and reflections on the session soon. A big thank you to our RE visitor for providing such an enjoyable learning experience!








# Year 1 Religious Education

This term, Year 1 have been learning about **places of worship** and how people practise their faith. The children will visit at least one place of worship in Harrow to see how different religions worship.









# **Year 2 Religious Education**

The children enjoyed celebrating the rich culture and now have a better knowledge of these two religions and their importance in our community.








# **Year 3 Religious Education**

### Summary of this term's learning objectives for the children:










# Year 4 Religious Education

In Year 4, children have been focussing on Christianity and what it means to be peaceful. Children have created their own peace symbols and are able talk about how the beatitudes and 10 commandments from Christianity can be applied to daily life.









#### What Year 4 Learnt in RE This Term

This term, Year 4 focused on Christianity and the concept of peace in different religions. Pupils explored key religious teachings, discussed how peace is central to various beliefs, and reflected on their understanding of respect for different cultures and religions.

Here's what some pupils had to say:

- "We learnt a lot more about Easter and what the celebration is all about. I think our RE lessons show respect for different religions because I can relate my religion to all others."
- "I like the concept of peace in all religions. Every religion has its own way of looking at peace, and that's really interesting."
- "I didn't know what beatitudes were before. I think it's great that we talk about all religions together."
- "I learnt how peace is related to all different religions. We learn about and respect every religion in our lessons."

Several pupils also visited places of worship this term, including churches, temples, and mosques, where they gained valuable insights into religious practices. One pupil shared, "I went to the mosque with my cousins and aunty for prayer. It was a great experience to connect what we're learning in class with real-life practices."


Year 4's reflections show how RE lessons not only enhance their knowledge of world religions but also encourage respect and understanding for diverse beliefs.

# Year 5 Trip to the Lelung Dharma Centre





#### Year 5 Trip to the Lelung Dharma Centre

This term, Year 5 visited the Lelung Dharma Centre in North Harrow as part of their RE learning about Buddhism. The trip gave the children an excellent opportunity to deepen their understanding of Buddhist beliefs and practices.

The visit began with the calming sound of a gong, and after removing their shoes, the children entered the serene environment of the centre. They listened to a fascinating talk about Buddhism and participated in a lively Q&A session, where they asked thoughtful questions to learn even more.

Towards the end of the visit, the children experienced a short meditation session, leaving them calm and relaxed for the walk back to school.

#### Izan shared his thoughts:

"I learnt that the Bodhi tree is sacred to Buddhists because in other countries where there are Bodhi trees, Buddhists meditate under them. I saw many beautiful paintings of monks and the Dalai Lama and even a gold-coated Bodhi tree leaf. There were also many artefacts from Buddhism and a meditating area. I felt calm while meditating—it was very peaceful."

The visit was a fantastic experience, bringing classroom learning to life and helping the children reflect on the peaceful practices of Buddhism.





# Year 6 Religious Education

In year 6, children learned about exploring the responsibility humans have in protecting the environment through Christian and Hindu perspectives. Pupils showed understanding of how religious teachings inform attitudes towards conservation and reflected on their own contributions to environmental care.



#### What do Christians believe about caring for the environment?

Why is it important to look after the environment? How does a view in a creator God affect how some Christians respond to environmental issues?

It is important to look after the environment because the forests, rivers and oceans give us food and drinks and the air gives us oxygen to breathe. If no one looks after the environment then we will have none of those things and **unfortunately DIF!!!**
